"Did God call you to this?" a cathedral parishioner asked me.

Much like John Newman and Thomas Merton, I am sure we don't know all the ways God is working through us. We just faithfully do what we think is right and God sorts the rest. As the prophet Micah put it: He has told you, O mortal, what is good, and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice and to love kindness and to walk humbly with your God? (Micah 6:8)



What is God calling you to? For some it will be service within the church for many it will be service within our wider community, for most it will be a mixture of varieties of service. At its best the church exists as an expression of God's love for the world and supports individuals and communities in expressing God's love. That sounds a bit daunting, but it needn't be. I shall do good, I shall do God's work; I shall be an angel of peace, a preacher of truth in my own place. Deign to fulfil your high purposes in me. I am here to serve you, to be yours, to be your instrument.

Young Church



Photo shows bells 1, 5 and 6 mouth upwards ready for ringing to take place.


The weight of the bells is, respectively, 5cwt, (256kg), 9cwt (457kg) and 11cwt (572kg) – yes, empirical weights are still the standard when it comes to the weight of bells.

Ringers are not obliged to attend one of the Sunday services at St Peters.



Price \$ 20, plus bring your own picnic lunch.






