

Views from the Pews - Another view of the Trinity

The doctrine of the Holy Trinity insists that the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, the three persons of the Trinity, are distinct, but not divided; different, but not separate or independent, and all interlinked by love. This idea of "one God in three persons" has always been hard to understand. The early theologians had to work through many possible formulations, ejecting some as heretical, amid fierce arguments. Eventually, the Church settled on the agreed definition most familiar to us, as summarised in the Nicene Creed adopted in the late 4th century.

Part of the problem is that the Latin *persona* originally meant a mask, as worn by actors to indicate the role they were playing; one actor could therefore wear more than one mask. Hence, God could be thought of as one actor playing three distinct roles in the drama of salvation. But when translated into our word *person*, the meaning changes for us: a person is a single unit, independent of other persons. So how can we speak of God as three persons, and yet still as only one person?

Had there been a neurophysiologist in Eden, he/she could have proposed another model based on the three different but interacting parts of the human brain, long ago identified by anatomists. The hindbrain is the seat of all our most ancient and automatic responses. It controls unconscious functions, like breathing and digestion, and instant reactions connected with survival and competition for status ('fight or flight'). The middle part of our brain is the origin of our heedless emotions and reckless ambitions. It receives images from below and adds powerful incentives to them. The forebrain is the thinking part of us, responsible for deciding how to manage all the messages formulated by our basic instincts. and to anticipate their consequences at a higher level than animals can. This idea offers another, much more personal analogy to the ancient insights of theologians.

According to Alister McGrath, Augustine taught that humanity is created, not merely in the image of God, but in the image of the Trinity. The challenge for us is to formulate new stories conveying the same truths in contemporary terms. So, by advances of science and the enabling grace of God, we can humbly model the Trinity in our own experience of body, soul and mind as different but loving and completely inter-dependent parts of our own personalities.

For you, the heavenly one, make all things new; you are the beginning and the end, the last and the first.

Praise, glory and love be yours, this and every day, from us and all people, here and everywhere. Amen.

The Lord's Prayer (You may wish to pray the Lord's Prayer in your own language. The Choir will sing.)

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Save us from the time of trial and deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and for ever. Amen. E tō mātou Matua i te rangi Kia tapu tõu Ingoa. Te Powhiri | The Invitation

Come God's people, come to receive Christ's heavenly food.

The minister says the following to each person.

The body of our Lord Jesus Christ which was given for you. Ko te tinana o tō tātou Ariki, i tukua nei mōu.

The blood of our Lord Jesus Christ which was shed for you. Ko ngā toto o tō tātou Ariki, i whakahekea nei mōu.

The communicant may respond each time Amen / Āmine.

All are welcome to receive communion. If communion is not your tradition, we invite you to come forward for a blessing, simply put an arm across your chest and a blessing will be given.

Please come forward and kneel or stand at the altar rail to receive the bread and wine or a blessing. Please ask if you need a gluten free wafer.

In the Anglican tradition, we use the common cup, with wine of a high alcohol content, in a silver vessel, to minimise infection risks. If you do not wish to receive the wine, communion is fully valid in one kind, either bread or wine, or you may wish to simply lift the cup, to show reverence and receive spiritually.

Please note, the practice of intinction is not permitted.

If you would like to light a candle for someone you love, or to give thanks to God, please feel free to do so at the back of the cathedral.
