

Views from the Pews: Easter Sunday

After the crucifixion, the Gospels recount many occasions when Jesus was seen alive again by people who had witnessed his death. At that time and since, people who never knew who he really was have tended to dismiss such stories as wishful thinking, or as hallucinations. And yet the radical transformation of the disciples is indisputable evidence that, whatever they had seen, it was no hallucination. They saw and spoke with, and even ate with, the real, living, material Jesus they had always known, for the whole period (conventionally, expressed as 40 days) until the Ascension. It took that long to overcome their astonishment, rearrange everything they had previously believed about the salvation of God, and to be convinced that he was indeed the risen Messiah.

It was not as if the people of the time did not know all too well what happens to a human body after death. When Jesus commanded the mourners to open the tomb of Lazarus, Martha objected, on the grounds that 'Lord, by this time there will be a stench, for he has been dead four days' Jesus replied that 'if you believe, you will see the glory of God', and went on to demonstrate his power to reverse the natural process already under way in Lazarus (John 11:39-40). John reports that many of the Jews did indeed believe in him then. Those who were not there, and now have no way to undo the bodily decay of ourselves and of those whom we love, have always found this challenge to the normal order of things too hard to handle. From that time to this, the stories of the raising of Lazarus, and of the Resurrection itself, are too easily dismissed as irrational fables.

In I Corinthians 15, Paul recounts a long argument with those who could not get past the secular view that there is no resurrection of the dead. Paul explains that the dead are laid down as perishable physical bodies, but raised in imperishable glory. On that day, our nature will be changed in an instant – we mere mortals will put on immortality. Anyone who has been granted some miniscule glimpse of the fathomless love of Christ as it sometimes touches us in small things (any closer, and we would be struck down, as Paul was) have reason to put our secular reservations in another box, and hold on to the mystery of faith.

A reading from the book of the Acts of the Apostles (10:34-43)

Then Peter began to speak to them: 'I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ—he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John

announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.'

A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians (15:1-11)

Now I should remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you—unless you have come to believe in vain.

For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to someone untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace towards me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them—though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. The Gospel –John (20:1-18) (we remain standing and turn to face the gospel | Ka tū tonu tātou ki te whakarongo ki te Rongopai)

The holy Gospel according to John. Praise and glory to God.

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went towards the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to their homes.

But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping?' She said to them, 'They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him.' When she had said this, she turned round and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping? For whom are you looking?' Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, 'Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away.' Jesus said to her, 'Mary!' She turned and said to him in Hebrew, 'Rabbouni!' (which means Teacher). lesus said to her, 'Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, 'I have seen the Lord'; and she told them that he had said these things to her. [NRSVA]

The Sermon

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who in unity with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, and has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Te kapu o te ora, i whakahekea nei mōu.

The communicant may respond each time: Amen / Āmine.

All are welcome at the Lord's table. Please come to the altar rail to receive the bread. If you would like to receive the wine move to a chalice station at either side. Wine can be received from the Common cup or individual cups, as desired.

Please note, the practice of intinction is not permitted.

If communion is not your custom or practice, we invite you to come forward for a blessing. Please, put a hand across your chest and a blessing will be given.

Gluten free wafers are offered at the Altar rail, please ask.

Candles to symbolise our prayers can be lit at the back of the Cathedral.
