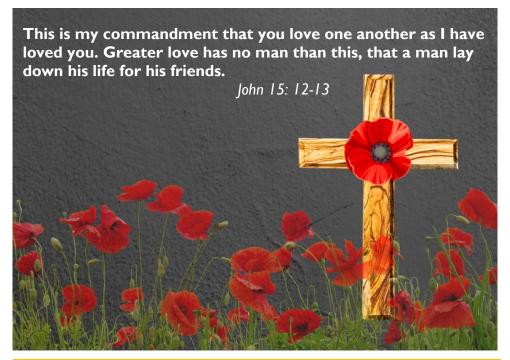

Views from the Pews - You did not choose me but I chose you

Conventional wisdom advises us to choose our friends wisely. We often evaluate a friendship based on the way it benefits us. Friendships formed with others who are popular, or good-looking, or rich or athletic, are appealing, although often only one way. Real connections form between good people who enjoy each other. The best of friends are those who share the same interests, who will stand by and help you when you need it and, if necessary, put your welfare before their own.

By those measures, Jesus chose some extraordinarily unconventional friends. His open acceptance of those at the bottom of the social heap often caused massive offence to those who considered themselves well above it. Take, for example, the touching little episode recounted in Matthew 9:10. 'And as he sat at dinner in the house, many tax-collectors and sinners came and were sitting with him and his disciples'.

Clearly, Jesus was completely at ease with them, and they with him. Such familiarity could only have developed after they had experienced the kind of life-changing understanding and personal forgiveness that radiated from Jesus with every breath he took. By contrast, nothing could have been further from the accepted etiquette of the day.

Matt 9:11 illustrates the shock-horror reaction of the self-righteous witnesses to this radically challenging scene. 'When the Pharisees saw this, they said to his disciples, 'Why does your teacher eat with tax-collectors and sinners?' This simple question makes clear that the Pharisees considered themselves belonging to a different social category to those they denigrated as sinners. Their inclusion of tax collectors with sinners must have been offensive to Mathew, a former tax collector himself.

Jesus would have none of it. Yes, the Pharisees made valiant attempts to keep the Law, including regular Temple sacrifices, assuming that nothing else was needed to achieve righteousness. But Jesus quoted Hosea 6:6a, "I desire mercy, and not sacrifice". He saw that reliance on ritual alone could not cure those who suffer sin-sickness but long for healing. On the contrary, he said, 'I came not to call the righteous, but sinners' because those who are well have no need of a physician, only those who are sick.

Happy are those who see the Church as a refuge for friends who know and trust each other to share their need of God.

Te Pōwhiri | The Invitation

Bread and wine; the gifts of God for the people of God.

May we who share these gifts be found in Christ and Christ in us.

The minister says the following to each person.

The body of our Lord Jesus Christ which was given for you. Ko te tinana o tō tātou Ariki, i tukua nei mōu.

The blood of our Lord Jesus Christ which was shed for you. Ko ngā toto o tō tātou Ariki, i whakahekea nei mōu.

The communicant may respond each time Amen / Āmine.

All are welcome to receive communion. If communion is not your tradition, we invite you to come forward for a blessing, simply put an arm across your chest and a blessing will be given.

Please come forward and kneel or stand at the altar rail to receive the bread and wine or a blessing. Please ask if you need a gluten free wafer.

In the Anglican tradition, we use the common cup, with wine of a high alcohol content, in a silver vessel, to minimise infection risks. If you do not wish to receive the wine, communion is fully valid in one kind, either bread or wine, or you may wish to simply lift the cup, to show reverence and receive spiritually.

Please note, the practice of intinction is not permitted.

If you would like to light a candle for someone you love, or to give thanks to God, please feel free to do so at the back of the cathedral.

Leaning into Advent



In each of the one-hour sessions, we will follow a structured, contemplative listening exercise (similar to Lectio Divina) using an Advent text. In Lectio Divina we listen for God's voice in the text, not necessarily to gain knowledge, but to be transformed by God's word.

Week 1 – Hope. The Patriarchs

Week 2 - Peace. The Prophets

Week 3 - Joy. John the Baptist

Week 4 - Love. Mary.

My hope is that we will allow God's word to speak through the material of our lives. We will listen for God's word as spoken through each group participant. We may hear the Biblical text in ways we have not yet encountered. Our personal experience, as it resonates with the text, may bring different understandings of the text. In listening to one another we encounter the word made flesh among us.

There will be a short take-home reflection on each text. Words that resonate with me when I think about Advent are: Wait; Watch; Listen; Stay Awake; Prepare.
